The appetizer was Yachae Kimbap, which is a Kimbap roll filled with a combination of peppers, carrot and onion with a sweet and tangy Nishiki rice.

The entree was Jjin Dalg, which is a seared chicken breast seasoned with a custom sauce and served atop a bed of crisp

and flavorful vegetables and spicy rice.

For dessert, the students prepared Hoejeon Seoltang Doneos, which are three traditional-style fried doughnuts with a

tart but sweet mango and five-spice sauce with a cup of hot tea.

In addition, Lieber designed and made the plates used in the competition. He used a glass kiln and two different processes to fire them.
